FROM OUR CHAIRMAN & CEO

Friends:

Even as we continued to navigate the impacts of a global pandemic, 2021 was a big year for First Step Staffing. Our team worked hard to advance our mission to put those most in need on the path out of homelessness into self-sufficiency. In sum, we employed 8,094 men and women who earned \$57 million in wages in 2021!

While navigating through a global pandemic presents challenges, it also brings opportunity. Over the last two years, the world began to recognize the value of the type of work our clients perform daily, from mail sorting to logistics to food manufacturing – what was once considered entry-level, low-skill, or low-wage work – is now ESSENTIAL to our lives and our economy. With the recognition of essential work comes increased pay rates and a new willingness to hire First Step clients.

First Step's ongoing successful organizational growth results from years of experience in replicating our alternative staffing model. In 2021, we officially launched operations in Orlando, FL. As a result of strong partnerships with the City and peer community-based organizations, in less than 12 months, First Step Orlando employed 241 individuals and provided more than 4,400 rides to and from work.

As we continue to grow, our mission remains the same – providing a hand up through the dignity of work. While increased pay for our clients is important, we know for our clients, work is so much more than a paycheck. It is hope and an opportunity to take the First Step on the path out of homelessness.


WHO WE SERVE

Homelessness in America is a national crisis that disproportionately impacts people of color.

Unfortunately, the same is true regarding most vulnerable population statistics. African Americans are over-represented relative to the general population when it comes to poverty, homelessness, and incarceration. African Americans make up 13 percent of the general population, but 21 percent of people in poverty, 40 percent of homeless people, and 30+ percent of males in prison.

People in poverty, those who are homeless, and/or recently incarcerated face barriers to securing employment; however, emerging out of poverty is not possible without employment. Barriers include lack of job skills, criminal records, and lack of transportation, to name a few. Many employers consider these barriers a risk.

First Step Staffing believes that all men and women, regardless of color or personal background, deserve the dignity of work and opportunity for economic mobility

The homeless population in Los Angeles has increased dramatically since the start of the pandemic. The most recent county is more indicates more than 65,000 people experiencing homelessness in Los Angeles County, up 15% from the prior year.

A report released by the Economic Roundtable indicates that because of the impact Covid-19 has had on vulnerable populations, "over the next four years the Pandemic Recession will cause chronic homelessness to increase 49 percent in the United States, 68 percent in California and 86 percent in Los Angeles."
